

THEIR PLAYGROUND

The entire 3 Vallées ski area, including 339 alpine ski runs totalling 600km for all levels. 50% of the runs (green and blue) are suitable for beginners and novice skiers. Other legendary runs are a must for keen skiers, such as the Roc de Fer. the favourite piste of champions, which will host the ladies' events in 2023 on its 2.5km length; La Face, its neighbour, is an uncompromising black run; the Mauduit, named after Méribel's champion skier, remains the benchmark for red runs with a 1,000m+ drop, becoming steeper and narrower as you enter the forest; the 3km-long Combe du Vallon requires endurance (it's one of the longest runs in les 3 Vallées) with incomparable snow thanks to its northerly orientation and, as a bonus, one of the most beautiful views over the Méribel valley from its 2,952m summit.



THEIR HABITS

In order to practise or perfect their sport, children and adults have a

choice of four ski schools. The **ESF** (French Ski School) offers all disciplines; the **ESI** (International Ski School) is multi-lingual; Oxygène has a fun and personalised approach; and Julie Pomagalski's **Prosneige** ski and snowboard school offers the methods of a champion.

For the rest of the time, there is a vast choice ranging from paragliding to visiting the Olympic Centre with its pool, Olympic ice rink, gym, spa, and a 14m climbing wall offering taster sessions. The latest go-to place for ski and board fanatics is the **Elements Park**, an area dedicated to different ski thrills. With its fun slope, boarder-cross and freestyle zone, it's the fun ski and board destination for all ages.



AT LUNCHTIME

Instead of losing precious ski time, they grab a quick sandwich made from local ingredients at Farto, the excellent delicatessen/wine shop in the resort centre which offers a selection of the best produce from the valley: artisan charcuterie, matured cheeses and natural wines. For a more comfortable lunchbreak, they opt for a quick savoury pancake made on the terrace of the Crêperie 2 du Doron, at the foot of the piste of the same name.

up comedy, happy hours and a great selection of beers and house cocktails. Another 'must' is Le Rastro: run by Chris, one of Méribel's 3 World Champion telemarking brothers.

THEIR BASE

The 4-star Alpen Ruitor Hotel, in the centre of Méribel-Mottaret whose ski-in/ski-out position allows them to be first on the slopes. This picture-postcard hotel features wood, tartan fabrics, club chairs around a large fireplace and generous Alpine-style buffets served in the *«old* chalet». The Anne Sémonin spa is intimate and the large terrace overlooks the slopes. The 44 cosy rooms illustrate the philosophy of the Fenestraz family: «Hotels are the soul of their owner».



The modernisation of the ski area continues apace with the arrival of a new, fast 6-seat chairlift, le Bouquetin, which replaces the old Plattières 3 gondola lift. Quicker and more comfortable, this lift is more energy-efficient and blends better into its environment.



WHY NOT TRY?

A beginners' Biathlon session, combining cross-country skiing and rifle shooting, taught by ESF instructors. Or the challenge of going down the Couloir Tournier, an ungroomed piste with a 75% (37°) gradient, at the top of Saulire, reserved to experienced skiers - find it at the top of the Saulire Express 2 gondola lift.

A MENTOR

Snowboard World Champion Julie Pomagalski. The grand-daughter of the founder of Poma ski lifts, she was born and still lives in Méribel where she has opened Prosneige, a sports shop which specialises in boot fitting, and a ski and snowboard school.

«Méribel is not just my history and my roots. It's also a resort which, in my view, has managed to preserve its architecture. It hasn't sacrificed any of its charm in order to develop its skiing. In terms of sport, we have the most beautiful playground for all levels and disciplines. That's true too for ski touring and off-piste. as we are next to the Vanoise National Park. It's also true for crosscountry skiing; we offer free use of an exceptional ski area. As for the Altiport, it's the world's most beautiful beginner zone. In addition, we benefit from an ideal orientation so we can ski in sunshine from morning to evening, and we enjoy a ski area that's both challenging and wooded. It's got everything».

They make the most of the spectacular setting and the many walking paths which

allow them to combine fresh air, fabulous scenery and easily accessible, good restaurants. Méribel is decidedly epicurean, with many initiatives such as wine-tasting evenings and food workshops, plus great restaurants where you can eat in or take away (such as Le Bokal, le Versant Gourmet, la Cantine



Depending on their mood, it's time to stop for lunch at either le Blanchot or le Clos Bernard. These two chalets, surrounded by fir trees, are universally popular.

Le Blanchot, lying next to the Altiport pistes, offers a traditional-style dining terrace and a more original cuisine since a young couple took it over and gave it a new lease of life.

Le Clos Bernard, nestling in the heart of the Altiport forest, offers locally sourced food cooked over a wood fire. And for children there's a giant dining tepee with its own waiter, an outdoor play area with sleds, and inside there are books, colouring pages and board games plus equipment for babies and toddlers.




Alternates between pampering and relaxing by the fireside. If après-ski isn't spent at the Nuxe spa in the 5-star Kaïla Hotel, it's at the Clarins Spa des neiges at L'Allodis for the special high mountain ski facial, or just to enjoy the environment of this hotel with its panoramic views over the whole Méribel valley. Before dinner, they head to the intimate bar at the Savoy for its sophisticated cocktail menu and platters of local charcuterie.

For dinner, two restaurants stand out, both with elegantly prepared food. While l'Atelier (a former carpenter's workshop turned into an intimate restaurant) reinterprets bourgeois cuisine with simplicity and honesty, Le Cèpe demonstrates its gastronomic ambitions and a passion for mushrooms, cooking with finesse and creativity, and the chef offers some delicious surprises for fungi fanatics.

THEIR BASE

The resort's first 5-star hotel, le Kaïla, which cultivates family-friendly luxury, having chosen beautiful, traditional materials, quality craftsmanship, and exceptional comfort levels.

With its restricted number of rooms and suites (fewer than 40), intimate spaces, welcoming feel of a refined family home, Nuxe Spa and aquatic centre, it has become a haven for lovers of discreet, peaceful and flawless luxury. Its restaurant, the Michelin-starred l'Ekrin, is a destination in its own right. Chef Laurent Azoulay, a great lover of truffles, combines the terroir of his adopted mountains with the colourful elegance of his native Provencal cooking. The result reaches the heights of the surrounding peaks and Le Jardin d'Hiver - Légumes du Jardin des Roy, which brings together some thirty different vegetables, has become a signature of the restaurant.





The Christmas holidays, to take advantage of the magical atmosphere; Easter for prolonged days on a sun-terrace; and outside of school holidays to avoid busy slopes and enjoy the calm of the mountains.



QUOI DE NEUF?

La Coursive des Alpes, one of Méribel's most

recent gastronomic restaurants, run by Chef Laurent Hillairet who has worked in the finest Parisian establishments. Here, within the walls of the former cinema in the resort centre, you can sip an aperitif on the ground floor or, on the contemporary mezzanine, you can enjoy elegant cuisine showcasing quality local produce and happy combinations of ingredients and fully flavoured juices.

THEIR MENTOR

Laurent Azoulay, Michelin-starred chef at L'Ekrin. This native of the

Vaucluse (in southern France) has spent the past eight winters in Méribel and has just opened his own Provencal bistro in Villedieu where he cooks over a wood fire.

«I enjoy bringing together these two cooking traditions and I've made it my challenge. I have found so many beautiful ingredients to work with in Méribel: fir, moss, trout, crayfish and Cep mushrooms. Each restaurateur has managed to create his own identity in this resort and that is one of Méribel's strengths, offering quality restaurants for every type of cuisine, whether gastronomy, bistros, mountain restaurants, traditional eateries or take-away dishes. I get just as much pleasure eating at Nicolas' Cantine de l'Alvar as enioving the stuffed pumpkin at the high altitude Pierres Plates or enjoying the conviviality of a good fondue at La Fromagerie or la Kouisena. I enjoy alternating fine, classic cuisine at the Grand Coeur with a good burger at l'Igloo. It depends on your mood and the atmosphere you want».

For this family, there's more to enjoy than just skiing. They especially enjoy the tableaux vivants of spell-binding panoramas and the typical villages of chalets, chapels and their architectural references to the heritage of this almost 100-year-old resort. On foot, according to their mood, they may explore Méribel Village, Le Raffort, Les Allues, Chandon, Le Villaret or Hauteville.

On the slopes, they choose their routes for the best views, favouring gentle outings to sporting challenges. Their favourite places include the viewpoint at the top of Mont Vallon overlooking the Gébroulaz Glacier, Vanoise National Park, Italian Alps, Maurienne and, of course, the Mont-Blanc: the top of Saulire with its view over the entire Méribel Valley, Grande Casse, Grand Bec, Aiguille du Fruit and other legendary peaks; and the unmissable top of Olympic Express with its viewpoint table and bird's eye view of the Méribel valley and its villages. Their family tradition is lounging in one of the Dragon hammocks that line the Pic Bleu piste, offering with a view over the neighbouring valleys.




THEIR BASE

The resort's latest hotel, the piste-side **5-star Coucou**, was opened last winter. Designed by architect Pierre Yovanovitch, it forms part of the small, prestigious Maisons Pariente group. With 55 rooms (including 39 suites) nestling high up at le Belvédère, it has a unique style - graphic yet relaxed. It includes a spectacular spa with a gym, steam room, sauna, whirlpool, hairdressers, two pools - indoor and outdoor - and for children there's a baby club, a kids' club (created by the experienced Sophie Jacquemin) and a teens' club for older children. For lunch or dinner, two gastronomic experiences are on offer: Italian cuisine at **Bianca Neve** and international cuisine at the **Beef Bar**.









Other than the unmissable selfie with the Méribel logo at the foot of the **Open Park**, this winter they'll be tracking down the recently redesigned giant photo frames on the summits of Côte Brune, Mont Vallon, Roc de Tougne, Plattières, Roc de Fer, Loze Express and Saulire Express.





«For a long time I wanted to do something related to my roots. I've skied in lots of ski areas around the world, and ours is extraordinary in terms of its scenery and performance. There's a huge variety of terrain even in the off-piste (pastureland, forests, and high mountains) and, thanks to the different slope orientations, you can enjoy sunrises and sunsets. One goes to Saulire or Burgin for the rocky, abrupt terrain and steep needles; to above les Allues at Les Crêtes for a magnificent view over Méribel and great off-piste too; or around the Mont Vallon, at the edge of the Vanoise National Park, for panoramic views over the Gebroulaz and Borgne glaciers... Whether you come here for a challenge or gentle skiing, Méribel remains one of the most beautiful resorts in terms of its scenery and architecture».



The Deep Nature spa is open to all, offering targeted treatments for après-ski, sport and relaxation, and even treatments for children. Here you'll find the spectacular, stone décor which has made such a success of this brand, which traces its roots to the flora and environment of the Alps.



Ludovic Roche, musician and member of the groups Hook and Rock Cab. This native of the valley plays all year round in Méribel, which he loves for its party culture as much as its landscape and architecture.

«Méribel has always promoted live music of a very high quality, and long before most other resorts. With a loyal British clientele, après-ski partying is part of the resort's identity, whether at the Rond-Point des Pistes, or at the Brasserie 80 for a more chic, relaxed atmosphere and eclectic live performances. There really is something for all tastes and it's this choice of vibes that makes evenings out so special in Méribel. There is a typically British atmosphere at Jack's, it's more "rock" and mixed at le Rambler. There's a similar choice with the clubs, with two places offering very different ambiances: Sully's is British and les Saint-Pères is more chic ».

Areas of untouched nature, silence and snowy peaks, and the valley's traditional villages and restaurants. This family embraces exertion and they like to push themselves. They enter the world of the early fur trappers through ski touring and Nordic skiing (Méribel was recently granted the Nordic France award in recognition of the high quality of this sport). They attain a sense of achievement by getting out of their comfort zone, gaining different perspective over the surrounding landscapes, and making new discoveries on each of their outings. On half or full-day outings, there's never any chance of becoming bored, their thrills are genuine.

They get caught up in the Explor'Games, an unusual adventure guided by an app: they must overcome traps and challenges «to find the 'Heart of Méribel', so restoring the balance which has reigned for thousands of years between man and nature in this special valley». They also treat themselves to a visit to the Raffort mill: here the children can learn at first hand the trades of a wood cutter and miller. And for those with surplus energy, there is always telemark skiing with the ESF.


LUNCHTIME



Food must be local, simple and tasty – with no exceptions! Once they have hung up their ski poles, they head for **Le Gourmet Savoyard**, the newest shop in Mottaret where they can stock up on produce from the valley, carefully selected from local farms and Savoyard artisan producers. Next door, the little **Tentation** interior decoration boutique offers a pretty selection of souvenirs and accessories such as leather items and Savoy crosses. The same approach is found at **L'Esquisse** which blends traditional and contemporary, where you can find beautiful wooden sledges and contemporary Alpine-themed tableware... Then it's time for drinks at le **Grand Coeur** bar, loved by generations of regulars who appreciate the tweedy and cosy atmosphere of one of the resort's oldest hotels. It also has an excellent range of whiskeys for connoisseurs.
















A MENTOR

Jean-Marie Choffel, who was Director of the Tourist Office for 20 years. A Méribel resident since 1986, he has skied here since 1960! This purist likes to remind people that Méribel was one of the first French ski resorts:

«Before 1932, there was no alpine skiing in France. It was just before the outbreak of the Second Wor-Id War that Méribel became one of the pioneering resorts. As well as establishing a very strict architectural code, the resort remained authentic because so many families made their homes here from the start. The developers closely involved the villagers in the resort's development and that's what made all the difference. There was no move away from using natural materials either, because of the shortages at that time, so the materials used were mainly local ones. Purists enjoy skiing in the original areas such as Burgin and Tougnète. You set out from 2,700m and arrive in the centre of the resort at 1,400m. That's a great descent. There is also le Mont Vallon with its north and west faces. We are in the centre of the world's most beautiful ski area and, from Méribel, it's easy to go in a different direction every day ».

With 45,000 hectares of wide open space to discover on foot or by ski touring or cross-country skiing, Méribel embodies the perfect natural paradise. One exceptional area celebrates its 30th year this winter: the **Tuéda Nature Reserve**, at the western extremity of the Vanoise National Park, where the largest Cembro Pine forest in the Alps is found. It encompasses 1,100 hectares of unspoiled nature, 540 varieties of plant and 400 species of animal. You can cross it via the Ours ski run which offers an immersive experience with its wooden sculptures of local fauna, five senses stimulation and picnic area.

Situated above 1,700m, the Altiport forest is the starting point for numerous walks and a paradise for cross-country skiers. The super-fit can alternate half or full-day off-piste tours in small groups with trail running on snow along the 25kms of walking paths through varied scenery.



THEIR HABITS

They like to make the most of nature and enjoy the peace and quiet on Méribel's lesser-known footpaths, and try the many activities suited to a gentler-paced holiday.

For example, they may get closer to nature on a pony trek, either in traditional style on horse-back or by ski-joëring.

Or they may take up ski touring with Méribel's mountain guides who offer exceptional itineraries such as the Grand Perron des Encombres and lay down sweeping tracks on north facing slopes when conditions are good.




A LUNCHTIME

This winter, le **Blanchot** is introducing a take-away service with a great choice, including vegan and organic dishes. What a joy to settle down amongst the Cembro Pines in the nature reserve for a sophisticated picnic!







Outside the busy periods, preferably as winter turns to spring so they can make the most of nature coming back to life and the lengthening days.



Danielle Bonnevie, ranger at the Vanoise National Park and Tuéda Nature Reserve. Resident in Méribel for the past 20 years, this nature-lover appreciates the richness of our wide valley.

«The vegetation zones start at 600 metres with fruit trees and beech forests, then higher up we find spruce, before reaching the heathland, then the alpine meadows which lead to the glaciers. These different strata promote greater biodiversity, that's why there's so much of interest! As for the Vanoise National Park and the Plan de Tuéda Nature Reserve, these are two protected areas. The Cembro Pine forest lies on all four slopes, which is very rare in Europe. Equally rare is the Twinflower, an arctic-alpine plant which still finds a favourable environment here. Many ski resorts were built on breeding grounds, which is why black grouse is found in so few other places. There are so many good reasons to set out on the numerous, maintained walking trails. There are paths and forest trails accessible to all: walkers, cross-country skiers, beginners, families and experienced trekkers».








their favourites are the quiet slopes through the wooded Altiport sector. They also make the most of the Olympic Centre with its fabulous views, where they can unwind in the sauna, steam room, whirlpool and indoor pool. They might book a high-altitude Hatha Yoga session to start their day or as a break between a walk and a relaxing treatment. Marcela leads these yoga sessions which take place on the Arpasson terrace which has a 180° view, and she can adapt them to beginners or experts. To de-stress or find their legs at the start of their holiday, they might treat themselves to an outing combining snowshoeing with Qi Gong. This ancient Chinese technique based on slow movements helps improve suppleness, breathing and cope with emotional stresses.

APRÈS-SKI

Head to le Spa by Payot at the **5-star Hô-**

tel & Spa L'Helios, an intimate and cosy space built of Jerusalem marble with leather chaises longues and a small infinity pool. It's a place where you can totally switch off and laze around or enjoy Payot's expert body and face treatments. A lesser-known venue is le Spa de l'Aspen Lodge, situated in a private residence where Laura gives tailor-made massages. These are customised to the needs of each individual - deep and relaxing after exertion, energizing for a fresh start, or calming to banish stress and tension - ideal for totally letting go over the week, perhaps with techniques evolving over three sessions. For treatments in your own accommodation, Magali (who has trained around the world in traditional relaxation methods) will come to give you a traditional Thai, Shiatsu or sports massage. As a Chinese energy therapist, she is also a certified Prana Vinyasa Yoga teacher.





One of the **Chalets du Hameau**, a small collection of stone and wood chalets in traditional architectural style, designed as contemporary ski-in, ski-out refuges with all modern comfort. They offer a

home-from-home in Méribel with all the facilities and services of a hotel: baby-sitting, driver, private ski instructor, private chef, spa, steam room, treatment room, gym and even a cinema room. It's the ideal arrangement: private accommodation without the responsibilities of home, allowing you to live life at your own pace, without any time constraints. It's a great way to turn your ski trip into a social detox: an opportunity to refocus and spend time exclusively with family or friends.





A MENTOR

Marcela Bemposta, who has taught Yoga in the 3 Vallées for 15 years. This Argentinian, who for years taught skiing in Méribel and the Andes, settled here permanently 32 years ago.

HOW TO GET TO MÉRIBEL




By Air, Lyon (2hrs), Genève (2hrs), Chambéry (1hr), Grenoble (1hrs30mins).

By road, only 15 minutes from the motorway. A43 Motorway to Albertville, RN90 dual carriageway to Moûtiers, then 18km on the D90 to Méribel.
